Stopping treatment is one of the most difficult decisions a couple can face together. Often it is much more difficult than the decision to start IVF, which was a time of optimism and expectation. There may have been a gnawing fear deep down that treatment may not work, but this seemed a long way off in the future.

For some, the pain of infertility is only overshadowed by the pain of losing a baby.

One of our newest Access members in the Angel Babies Foundation, a charity set up to provide peer support, grief counselling to individuals and families following the loss of a baby through miscarriage, stillbirth, neonatal death and support for babies born prematurely or with abnormalities. Peer support counselling, assistance and advice is also provided for couples experiencing infertility and those undergoing Assisted Reproductive Technology and IVF treatment.

They also work closely with nurses and allied health workers to empower them to support those in their care experiencing fertility, pregnancy and infant related anxiety, loss and grief. We support them through their own losses and in the workplace.

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3. Our patron ties the knot!

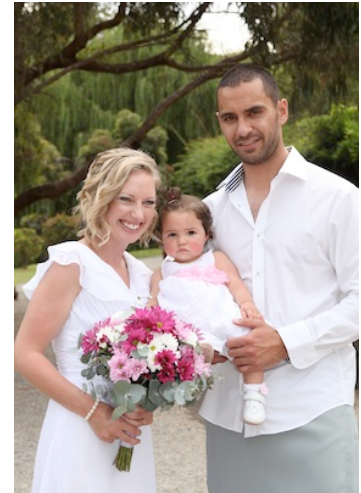
Our Patron, Candice Reed, was recently married to her partner of seven years, Derek Thum, at Inglewood Estate, Kangaroo Grounds in Victoria.

6. The case for egg-sharing

In most developed countries women are deferring pregnancy until well into their 30s. In doing so, though, they are raising their risk of infertility, according to **Kamal Ahuja**, fertility specialist and scientific & managing director of The London Women's Clinic.

Many women are willing to use donor eggs in treatment, but latest HFEA figures suggest that a current shortfall in the UK will only get worse. Where are those eggs to come from?

7. Frozen embryo babies heavier and healthier - study

IVF babies born from frozen embryos are heavier and result in longer pregnancies than those born from fresh embryos, research suggests. A study presented at the British Fertility Society annual meeting says transferring frozen embryos may lead to healthier babies.
